Welfare Rights Report

Community Legal Service

Introduction

For those who aren't aware, the Hull Council of Disabled People has provided a benefit advice service since the year 2000. The team has gone through various transformations since that time. The team holds the Community Legal Service Quality Mark for general help including casework.

The provision of good quality advice should never be taken for granted. Welfare rights advice services provide a multitude of support, advice and advocacy services to a wide range of people, many having multiple and varied needs. Welfare rights advice brings financial, social and health benefits to the people who receive it.

The demand for the advice services that we offer has never been higher, so our main priority is to preserve the service that we presently offer. Without funding this will not be possible, and our ultimate aim is to expand the service that we offer whilst maintaining the quality of service that is presently provided.

Why is welfare rights advice important?

The current level of take-up for welfare benefits and tax credits, combined with the complexity of system and the diversity of potential claimant population, suggest strong continuing demand for effective and accurate welfare rights advice services.

The provision of welfare rights advice can make a substantial difference to people, bringing huge relief to recipients, not least financially. There are established links between poverty and ill-health. The extra resources acquired by clients, tends to be directed toward extra spending on fuel, food, education, recreation and transport. This leads to improvements in living standards, general health, and a reduction in social exclusion.

It is clear that people have difficulty understanding and accessing their full welfare benefit entitlement and it is our aim to help our service users to secure all appropriate benefits and services.

Why don't people claim what they are entitled to?

Understanding the claim process isn't the only reason that people do not claim. People are dissuaded from claiming for a variety of reasons and the main ones appear to be:

- Lack of awareness of entitlement;
- Previous (bad) experience of claiming;
- Complexity of the tax and benefits system;
- Stigma associated with means testing;
- Reluctance to be subjected to intrusive questioning;
- The belief that claiming is not financially worthwhile.

One of the goals of the welfare rights team is to tackle those barriers to claiming. It is undoubtedly a massive task and advice services both locally and nationally will need work together and learn from each others experiences to enable people to receive everything that they are entitled to.

is the service cost effective?

The cost effectiveness of welfare rights advice is positive, if broadly anecdotal. Other charitable organisations have attempted to quantify the true benefit to the service-users in comparison to the funding that has been provided. Some estimate that around £44 is gained for service-users for every £1 of funding, whereas some estimate the benefit to service-users is as high as £85 for every £1 of funding. Wherever the truth lies, it is clear that investing in good quality welfare rights advice benefits not only the service user, but also the local economy as a whole – after all, all this money has to be spent somewherel

This service has been run over recent months at a minimal cost, and thanks must go to the Hull City Council's Welfare Rights Service for their continued support. We provide advice outlets at our Ferensway Office, and from both the Carer's Centre and Age Concern offices. The grid below shows just how busy our team have been over the last year:

We are looking forward to another productive year working for the people of Hull and surrounding areas.

GARDENING PROJECT REPORT 2005/06

I joined the HCDP as a placement in 2004 and was offered the position of Gardening Supervisor in December 2004; I accepted and started in January 2005. I run the project dealing with our client's requests for their gardens to be kept in a clean neat state.

The aim of the project is to offer our clients a regular garden service preferably on a 6-week rota. This has sometimes proved difficult due to adverse weather conditions. Even so we managed to keep 250 gardens in good order in the last financial year.

We have bought a new (second hand) van so this makes it easier to keep the project running smoothly. We also raised the funds to get ourselves a new trailer.

We are working towards acquiring another van so that we can run 2 parallel teams.

We have asked our clients to fill out feedback questionnaires and the responses have been 100% positive.

The income we earn is on average £13:00 per garden, but we have done several larger garden clearances, the money is ploughed back into the organisation and covers all costs that are generated by the project.

We are currently working hand in hand with Humber Care and the local Welfare Support Services; they refer clients to us that need our help and assistance.

We also work with A4E, (Action 4 Employment) Fern Training and Skills Initiative, they provide us with placements & in return we provide the placements with the training they require to help them gain useful employment.

All in all it has been quite a successful year for the gardening project. I would like to thank all the placements and volunteers that helped me make it a success.

DECORATING PROJECT REPORT 2005/06

I joined the HCDP as a placement in 2004 and was offered the position of Decorating Supervisor when I became a volunteer in December 2004; I run the project dealing with client's requesting help decorating their homes.

The aim of the project is to offer our clients a service that they can afford and where possible make their homes a cleaner friendlier environment.

We are working towards acquiring another van so that we can run 3 teams, in the warmer weather the 3rd van would be used for the gardening project and in winter possibly to run another team of decorators.

We have asked our clients to fill out feedback questionnaires and the responses have been 100% positive.

The income we earn is on average £40:00 per day, but we have done several larger homes, working on average 7-14 days. The money is ploughed back into the organisation and covers all costs that are generated by the project.

We are currently working hand in hand with Humber Care and the local Welfare Support Services; they refer clients to us that need our help and assistance.

We also work with A4E, (Action 4 Employment) Fern Training and Skills Initiative, they provide us with placements & in return we provide the placements with the training they require to help them gain useful employment.

All in all it has been quite a successful year for the decorating project. I would like to thank all the placements and volunteers that helped me make it a success.

FINANCIAL CONTROLS

The Charity is managed and run by the Board of Trustees and paid staff supported on a daily basis by volunteers.

INVESTMENT POWERS AND RESTRICTIONS

There are no restrictions on the Charity's powers to invest.

The investment strategy is set by the Trustees and is reviewed annually. It takes account of income requirement, risk profile and future expenditure.

REVIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The level of Charity operations was reviewed by the Trustees and the transport operations are run in partnership with West Hull Community Transport.

The café has continued to be successful.

A wheelchair hire service has been available throughout the year under review and members have made use of this as necessary.

During the year under review there is a net outgoing resource of £9,354 on unrestricted funds and a net incoming resource of £16,702 on restricted funds, a total net incoming resource of £7,348 which has been added to funds brought forward of £38,265 leaving balances carried forward of £45,613.

The financial position of the charity is shown in the financial statements.

RESERVES POLICY

It is the policy of the Charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are mostly free reserves, at a level equivalent to at least 3 months expenditure. At 31st March 2006 the Charity had unrestricted reserves of £14,694.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2006

GOING CONCERN

The operation of the Charity is dependent upon grant income from the Hull City Council. The service level agreement expires in March 2009 but may be terminated at any time giving six months notice.

The Board of Trustees have considered the future operation and financial commitments of the Charity and are of the opinion that the Charity will continue to operate in its present form and be able to discharge its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2000) and the Companies Act 1985.

Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small.

Income

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants is included in incoming resources when these are receivable.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants are for particular purposes, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in these categories. certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on an appropriate basis.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixture and Fittings -10% on cost Motor Vehicles -7 years straight line

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.
